LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT

WE'RE BACK!

Did you miss us? We sure missed you! But rest assured that this board has continued to work behind the scenes these last few months. And now, the fruit of our labor:

Our transition to a not-for-profit corporation independent from the Chief of Chaplains office (OCCH) is complete, and I am excited to announce that the Military Council of Catholic Women has been incorporated in the District of Columbia as its own corporation! We are now our own independent body under the tax-exempt umbrella of the Archdiocese.

We are so grateful to Archbishop Broglio and the staff of the Archdiocese for their unwavering support and guidance during this period of transition. The willingness of AMS to support MCCW as we worked to incorporate shows the value of our work in Catholic women's ministry.

To help with some of the new requirements we will face as a 501(c)3, I have decided to appoint a Stewardship Manager. Michelle Hokenson has agreed to fill this role – she will oversee our fundraising campaigns, and will be working hard in the coming months to build our financial resources so we can provide chapel groups with training & spiritual resources.

What does this mean to you at the chapel level? Your group should meet and plan as usual. Catholic women's ministry at the chapel level will continue as it always has, but without any sort of hierarchy above the garrison level (i.e. no regional or worldwide board with authority over chapel groups). Your Priest chaplain is the authority for your group. If you live in an area without a Priest chaplain, the installation chaplain will assist you.

MCCW-Worldwide Inc. will continue to function as a resource for our Catholic military women - providing training, written resources, and assistance when asked, as well as publishing newsletters and holding conferences. Please continue to check our Facebook page and websites for information you can use in your chapel groups. Feel free to contact me directly if you have any questions or would like to discuss any of these changes. And keep those prayers coming!



Our Church has so many blessings and opportunities to grow in our relationship with Christ. We are all at different points on our faith journeys and what speaks to one woman's heart might not be the same intensity for another woman's heart. We all know

what works in our lives to help that transformation process whether it be attending daily mass, spending time in the classroom of silence and reflection, just being with Christ in Adoration, serving the poor in soup kitchens, praying outside Abortion clinics, volunteering in church service ministries (such as serving as: altar linen society members, extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist, ushers, faith formation teachers, lectors), visiting the imprisoned through prison ministry, being a foster care or adoptive parent, leading a Mother's Prayer group, leading a faith study, or in a variety of other ways valuable in bring Christ more present in our lives and the people around us.

Consider asking that woman in the pew behind you or one of your neighbors to join you in a ministry that brings joy to your heart. Be the personal invitation to another daughter in Christ to step out in a radical way with you. With our deployments and on-going moving, as military wives and members we are united in that commonality of our journey. Use this Year of Faith as a catalyst to continue to try to not only transform your own heart but bringing along other women to help transform their hearts too. I will be the first to admit that it is scary to ask these type of questions and the possibility of rejection is there. One of the things I learned at a Life Teen Conference in the Netherlands is we need to continue to extend our invitation potentially four to six times to even the same person in some cases before they join us on the adventure of growing closer to Christ. As typical Americans, we yield on the first or second time extending the invitation for fear of being considered a stalker or crazy Catholic.

You know the joy you receive from the many ways you actively participate in our Faith. Step out in radical faith and try to help others experience that same joy that only the Lord can give.
