

**Praying with Icons:** Do you love the imagery and art of Christianity? If so, we have a presentation for you! Praying with Icons will instruct attendees in the steps of writing icons and in the practice of praying with icons as windows to heaven. Come see how this spiritual practice can enrich your prayer life.

**Growing Leaders - Best Practices for Chapel Group Boards:** Through the analogy of gardening, this program will help current chapel leaders consider how to identify the talents within the chapel groups. ## Military Council of Catholic Women-Worldwide: The Sheila Baker Award for Outstanding Achievement

#### Description

The Sheila Baker Award for Outstanding Achievement is established by the Board of Directors of the Military Council of Catholic Women – Worldwide in memory of Sheila Baker. Sheila was a true leader and role model. She was a mentor and friend of MCCW for nearly thirty years.

Sheila Baker began her involvement with MCCW in the early 1970's. She worked tirelessly at all levels of MCCW...at the chapel level, at the area (now reorganized as regions) level and at the national level. Sheila was president of MCCW-Europe for two terms in the early 1990's.

When she returned to the states, Sheila held several board positions with MCCW-USA. She was the Northeast Area Coordinator until her death in 2005.

Sheila's dedication to the mission of MCCW to empower, educate and support Catholic women in spirituality, faith, leadership and service was evident by her loving service to the Catholic chapel communities at which she worshipped. In addition to her involvement in MCCW, Sheila was active in religious education, RCIA and many other chapel ministries.

In 1992, Sheila was awarded the Archdiocese for the Military Services Award. This award recognizes persons who "in their personal lives are outstanding in all respects, motivated by religious values, practice religion faithfully, give good example to others and are held in high esteem by associates."

Clearly, Sheila was well loved and respected. She faithfully served as a mentor to many subsequent and future leaders of MCCW-Worldwide.

In order to honor Sheila and her memory, this award is to be presented to members of MCCW... members who have exhibited enduring and outstanding support and accomplishments in furthering the goals and mission of MCCW-Worldwide.

Sheila Baker's legacy to the Military Council of Catholic Women is one of dedicated leadership, love and grace. May we all strive to live up to this legacy and may Sheila enjoy eternal rest in God's heavenly kingdom as we honor her memory.

## A Season to Serve

Greetings from Policies and Procedures and the Nominations Committee for MCCW-Worldwide. This is an exciting time for both of these connected entities as we embark on a new path. I am so excited to see the new process for filling board positions come to fruition. Michelle Hokenson has blessed us with her time and talent and has worked very hard to plan our new Discernment Process. I believe it will add more thought by women interested in serving our blessed group, and will bring more prayer to the entire process.

Conference is soon upon us. This has traditionally been and continues to be the venue where we install our new board. This year we will not only install a new Executive Board but also install new Regional Coordinators. In the past this has been done in alternating years. So, there are many opportunities to serve the group that continues to serve you!

We are looking to fill your Executive Committee with a President, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President, Financial Manager and Secretary. Each region must also have a Regional Coordinator. Are you wondering if you have the abilities to serve in any of these positions? I will post duty descriptions in the next week on our Facebook page.

Have you felt a call to serve? Many different chapel groups and wonderful ladies have supported me through different seasons of my military life. There were other seasons I knew I could give back and really felt I had something to offer. Is this your season?

In order to serve on the Executive Committee or as a Regional Coordinator a nominee must:

- 1. Be an Active Duty Service Member or female spouse of an Active Duty Service Member for Executive Board positions, or Active Duty retiree or female spouse of an Active Duty Retiree for the Regional Coordinator positions.
- 2. Be a Catholic in good standing.
- 3. Must have the endorsement and support of her local priest.
- 4. Be affiliated with an active local chapel group.
- 5. Support the goals and mission statement of MCCW-Worldwide.
- 6. Have the capability, gifts and talents to perform the duties of the office.

Have you felt a call to serve? It is a commitment and should not be entered into lightly. Here are a few questions to help you discern. Is this your season?

Please pray: "Holy Spirit, please bring me clarity and truth."

- 1. As I stay in touch with reality, what pre-existing conditions exist in my life that I cannot change that may interfere with my serving on the MCCW Board?
- 2. Be honest and realistic about your timetable. Don't be hasty about making this decision but don't procrastinate either. Have I prayed about serving and sufficiently thought out the sacrifices that may be needed?
- 3. Bounce your thoughts and plans off of those you trust. Your friends and confidents are more objective. Have I confided in those who truly know me well, those who can recognize my strengths and weaknesses without being subject to my personal issues?
- 4. Listen to your heart, mind, and intuitions. Make sure they are all rising from your soul. Consider practicality, functionality and rationality as well as emotions. Am I coming from a place of common sense along with the emotional side of this decision?
- 5. The "Evil Spirit" often tends to complicate decision making with confusion and fear.

- 6. Avoid decision-making during a crisis. A level head and internal peace will allow you to judge freely and honestly. Which choice yields the most peace, justice, faith and love as well as will bear the most fruit? Have I cleansed myself of selfish tendencies?
- 7. Know your limits! To honestly know ourselves requires humility, common sense and love. I do not seek the cross, but am I prepared to accept it?
- 8. Mourn the possibilities not chosen and the opportunities missed. Life is a path of letting go and dying. "Every time we let go of something we die a little." Eventually we will be asked to let go of everything (when we die) and will gain our salvation. Have I let go of that which was not meant to be in my life?
- 9. Jesus is key. God gave us Jesus to show what it truly means to be a human being. If we follow Jesus' teachings and imitate how he treated people with mercy, truth, faith, fairness, justice and love we will be inspired in every decision we make and we will grow to know, love and serve him more profoundly. Do I try to live the message of Jesus to all the I people I encounter in my daily life?
- 10. Holy Spirit please inspire me to make this decision.

Discernment should include meditation on Mark 10:42-45 where Jesus defines for us the servant-leader concept: Jesus summoned them and said to them, "You know that those who are recognized as rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones make their authority over them felt. But it shall not be so among you. Rather, whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all. For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve.

## February Prayers for Brian Ebenau, AMS Co-Sponsored Seminarian

Does your military chapel have a full-time Catholic priests? Was your service member able to attend Mass and the sacraments regularly on their last deployment? The answers to these questions probably brought home the fact that the number of Catholic chaplains has dropped almost 50% since 2001. Today there are less than 250 active-duty Catholic chaplains for the 275,000 active-duty troops who identify themselves as Catholic (the largest religious group except for those who list no faith preference at all). <sup>1</sup> Catholics make up about 25% of the military while Catholic priests account for less than 8% of military chaplains. <sup>1</sup>

The Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA (AMS) and Fr. Aidan Logan, O.C.S.O., the AMS Director of Vocations, are working hard to increase the number of priests for the military. Currently there are 35 seminarians who have made a commitment to become Catholic military chaplains. It takes time and money for these men to become priests and this is where we as Catholic women can help.

All of the current seminarians have designated sponsors, but funds are still needed. The AMS has two retreats a year for men discerning a call to the priesthood and military chaplaincy. In addition, the Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program provides monetary and moral support for seminarians approved by their bishops for future assignment as military chaplains. These programs make continual demands on the financial resources of the Archdiocese. The AMS receives no government funds. Please consider making individual donations to the Archdiocese for the Military Services and designate them for the Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program. Each month, the Well will highlight one of the co-sponsored seminarians. February's seminarian is Brian Ebenau. Below is a copy of the interview he gave in a previous edition of Salute, the magazine of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA. Please pray for this seminarian. Consider saying three Hail Mary's for him every day. Offer up a weekly rosary for his studies and commitment. Pray for him during your Catholic Women of the Chapel meeting and Mass each week. Consider writing Brian a letter of encouragement and gratitude. You can do it with the women in your chapel group, with your family or on your own. Your letter could be exactly what he needs to hear today. Letters may be sent to the AMS and they will be forwarded on to him (addressed: Brian Ebenau, Co-Sponsored Seminarian, Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, PO Box 4469, Washington, D.C. 20017). My family will be praying for him and thanking God that he has answered God's call to serve our community and our military members overseas.

When was the first time you thought you might have a vocation to the priesthood?

Very shortly after my return from Bagram/Kandahar, Afghanistan (June 2006). The insights and changes that took place then were strengthened and affirmed in the midst of my next deployment to the United Arab Emirates (Al Dhafra AB – March 2007). There, I returned to the Sacraments on a regular basis and established a great rapport with the Catholic Chaplain, Fr. Ernie Berthelette, whom I continually maintain contact with today. This is when I first experienced communion with priests in a real way and acknowledged my growing interest/passion for Church affairs and Roman Catholic doctrine.

What is your favorite scripture passage and why?

I always return to the beginning of my knowledge of God and walk of faith. For this, the Psalms, Wisdom, and Proverbs hold a special place in my faith because they were the first books that God used to introduce Himself to me. Proverbs 2 truly captures the essence of my conversion and initial understanding of God – that He is Wisdom Itself, which surpasses all human knowledge and understanding. Proverbs 2 not only recalls my initial encounter with God but the reality that my own life and experiences actually passed through the truth contained in Proverbs 2. Eternal wisdom and understanding begins with receiving the Lord instead of human ambition, as the opening chapter of Proverbs writes.

Epiphany - On January 6 my sisters in faith visited my home to celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany and one another. Fr. Ohm was gracious to come and perform a house blessing of health, purity, humility, mercy, strength and goodness; I pray that the blessings of health, purity, humility, mercy, strength and goodness fill every fiber of us all.
